### Opening doors



"Refugee sponsorship is the most powerful and meaningful thing you can do," says Tyler Berglund, owner of Hamilton's Doors Metal Bar and Taco Joint and BVOR refugee sponsor. It's also "the most metal thing you can do – it's very challenging, and it's very hardcore," he says. It's been two years since Tyler, a self-described metal head, and his colleagues and relatives, all in their 30s, decided to sponsor refugees through the BVOR program as a Group of Five.

Through RSTP they were matched with a young family of four, Syrian Kurdish refugees living in a Lebanese camp, who arrived in Canada in the summer of 2018. Since then, the group has been learning on many levels. "Refugee is a complex term," says Jamie Mallory, another sponsor. "Ultimately, you just approach people with care."

St. Giles Presbyterian Church in St. Catharines provided early support. "We're all atheists, and this really changed our perspective on churches and what they do," says Tyler. A local interpreter, Rola Chatah, volunteers with them. "We've met so many good people through this," says Tyler.

### The Blended Visa Office-Referred (BVOR) Program

The BVOR Program helps resettle refugees identified by United Nations Refugee Agency (UNHCR) as the most vulnerable in need of resettlement. It is called blended because it is a cost sharing arrangement. Immigration Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) provides up to six months of income support for the newcomers, while private sponsors provide another six months of financial support, start-up costs and up to one year of social and emotional support.

The family and sponsors have a warm relationship, as can be seen in this RSTP video. "It's been really helpful for me to spend time doing things ... outside my comfort zone," says Caleb Collins. He's a sponsor and drummer when he's not working at Doors. "I feel like I'm better equipped now to address things in my own life."

The group has embarked on its second sponsorship. "We plan to do this as long as we are able," says Collins. They are also promoting refugee sponsorship to their growing circle of followers, helped along by this CBC Hamilton web article on their sponsorship (it features RSTP video footage).

Tyler's favourite metal blogs have picked up the CBC story as well. The publicity is "spreading the message of love and kindness triumphing over superficial differences," says Tyler.

"Ultimately I hope it will encourage more to sponsor. Already I've been contacted by folks interested in joining us."

## Burundian woman looking for sponsors in Edmonton, AB

A 52-year-old Burundian woman currently in Tanzania, accompanied by her 19-year-old daughter and a 17-year-old girl she looks after. She has a Grade 9 education, work experience in farming and can speak French. They cannot return to their home country as they fear persecution based on their ethnicity.

The UN Refugee Agency notes that Burundian refugees in Tanzania "arrive to find camps full and only temporary shelters available. Health centres are struggling to cope with huge numbers of patients. Education is very basic, and children lack sufficient learning materials. Hundreds of children in Tanzania attend classes under trees."

## BVOR incentive for SAHs (reminder)
